Part 2

The following blog entry is about some recent research involving children.

Young children often have difficulty seeing their parents' point of view. It turns out there may be a good reason for this.

According to Dr. Anne Horowitz at the University of Colorado, the ability to see things the way someone else does develops slowly, over time. Dr. Horowitz's research suggests that children do not have this ability until about the age of four.

"We've done experiments with children," Dr. Horowitz explained. "In one, we have kids watching two puppets – Susan and Jenny – playing with a ball. The puppets play with the ball, and then put it in a box. Then Susan leaves, and Jenny takes the ball and plays with it some more by herself. Jenny then puts the ball into a bag. We then ask children 'Where will Susan first look for the ball?' Children under four all say she's going to look in the bag. But older kids understand that Susan will first look in the box. Even though that's not where the ball actually is, they understand that Susan thinks that's where it is. The older children are able to see the situation from Susan's point of view."

Dr. David O'Sullivan at the University of Vermont is an expert on the human brain. He says that a part of the brain known as the medial prefrontal cortex is involved in recognizing what a situation looks like to someone else. According to Dr. O'Sullivan, this part of the brain continues to develop until adolescence. "We've done lots of brain scans on people of different ages. In **this area**, we're able to see large differences among very young children, adolescents, and adults."

Taken together, the data supports the studies' findings that very young children are unable to see another person's point of view because their brains have not yet developed fully.

Part 4

The following passage is about the history of jeans.

Jeans are without a doubt one of the most common items found in almost all wardrobes. Today every American owns, on average, 7 pairs of jeans. However, jeans are not a new invention. The oldest jean-like trousers made of denim, a strong cloth, were worn in the 16th century by sailors, in the city of Dhunga, India.

In the 18th century, jeans-makers began making jeans out of cotton. Because these pants were very tough, they were bought by workers who did not have a lot of money and needed trousers that would stay strong and in good condition over a long period of time.

The 19th century is when jeans became more popular in the USA, thanks to Levi Strauss - a German fabric salesman, who began selling blue jeans under the name "Levis" to builders. To protect his design from being copied, Levi Strauss applied for legal protection known as a patent. He received U.S. Patent No.139,121 for his improved jeans design on May 20, 1873. That is the reason why May 20th is known as the birthday of jeans, even though it is actually the day that Levis jeans were "born."

During the 1950s, jeans gained even more popularity when the late Hollywood actor, James Dean, wore a pair in the movie "Rebel without a Cause." Jeans became a sign of being different and teenagers who wore them were thought of as troublemakers. A teenager was not allowed to go to a restaurant, theater, or school in jeans.

Through the 1960s jeans increased in popularity as a symbol of change and were worn by many university students. In the 1980s many companies began making jeans that **they** advertised by using famous models and actors.

The first pair of jeans were sold for only \$1.25, which is very different from the cost of jeans today. The price for the popular denim trousers currently range from \$50 to more than \$3,000 for those made by top fashion designers.
