In this part of the listening section, questions twenty-six through thirty, you will hear a short talk. After the talk, you will hear five questions that are also written in your test booklet. Answer the questions by choosing A, B, or C based on the information in the talk and darken the appropriate circle on your answer sheet. You may take notes as you listen. You will hear the talk **twice**.

You are going to hear a guided tour around a dinosaur exhibition.

Now, listen to the beginning of the tour followed by an example question.

Woman: Welcome to the first permanent exhibit

of dinosaur fossils available for public viewing in Sydney. These bones - we call them "fossils" - are really copies of originals from the New York Museum of Natural History, which has one of the best and largest collections of dinosaur fossils in the world. We have copies

of fossils from around the globe, from

Bejing to Cape Town.

You can easily see why. There are three large horns on the head, as well as other bones around the neck, which were used for protection. Now, Triceratops was a herbivore, in other words, a plant eater, and we know that by the bird-like beak it has at the front of its mouth, which was used for tearing off leaves and branches, and by its flat teeth, which are more suitable for grinding plant material than chewing meat.

Moving, on, next to Triceratops we have a full-sized Tyrannosaurus Rex or T.Rex. The first thing you notice about T. Rex is its size. The typical adult was about seven meters tall and sixteen meters long. The name Tyrannosaurus Rex means, of course, "king of the lizards," but you might be surprised to learn that its closest relatives today are not lizards. In fact, the T. Rex is more closely related to modern birds. Let me show you what I mean. Look at this back leg. It's almost four meters long, but see.. the bones of the feet and the leg? ... You can see the connection with birds. Notice the three-toed foot, and how the shape of the leg is very much like that of a modern bird you'd see today. Later we'll see a film about how T. Rex hunted other dinosaurs and used its sharp teeth.

Okay, next up, our full skeleton of Stegosaurus. Stegosaurus is one of the more well-known dinosaurs because of the distinctive double row of plates on its back. For a long time, people assumed the plates were for protection, but now scientists believe they were used as a way for Stegosaurus to manage its body temperature - as a way to keep from getting too hot or too cold. Stegosaurus was also a herbivore, and as you can see from the ribs, it had a very large stomach. It protected itself with its long spike-covered tail that you see here. Notice its large back legs; it's likely that Stegosaurus could stand

upright, perhaps so that it could get to the leaves on trees.

All right, now, as we continue along, you'll see inside the glass case that we have a one-hundred-million-year-old dinosaur egg from a dinosaur called Hypselosaurus. An adult Hypselosaurus was about thirteen meters long. They were also herbivores. Now, this egg is real, it's not a copy; it was found in France and is one of the largest and best-preserved dinosaur eggs in the world. Now, next to the egg, you'll see a model, an artist's idea, of what it might look like when a young Hypselosaurus hatched and came out of the egg.
